#### MOMENTS FROM THE MUSEUM

#### Berkley's American Legion: A Community Tradition

The American Legion organization was founded in 1919 in France. Worldwide there are 12,000 posts and 1.6 million members. Today, I will share with you the history of the Berkley American Legion Post #121 located at 80 Myricks St., Berkley Mass.

In 1960, Berkley resident Al Gouveia along with Ben Rose and 10 other Berkley men, formed the American Legion Post 121, and they worked hard to get it on a solid foundation. There were no paid positions because the American Legion is a non-profit service organization. The Town of Berkley allowed them to use the old Myricks School as a meeting place. The only source of heat in the building at that time was large, hot air wood stoves. Due to a lack of funds, there were no tables or chairs, so the founders worked with what they had available to create a welcoming atmosphere for the public. They placed 50 bales of hay around the walls and bunches of corn stalks in the corners. This 'decor' set the stage for good old barn dancing with Gus DeMoranville and his band providing the music.

As simple as this sounds, their efforts were a success! Forty to fifty people came each weekend to dance and used the hay bales for seats between dances. After a while it was decided that hay bales were a fire hazard so they were removed and 1 x 12-inch board seats were placed around the hall. The front yard of the former school was all grass but when it rained the yard turned to all mud. A wrecker would be standing by to pull cars out of the mud when the patrons needed to leave. The backyard of the American Legion became a ball field and playground. Stanley Hadro and Ben Rose used their bulldozers to uproot tree stumps. Stanley was the Highway Surveyor at the time and called on McCabe Sand and Gravel to borrow their grader. It took him a whole week to level out the field.

In the course of a few years the Legion had clambakes as a way to build capital for future expenses. The clambakes were a success, and it was eventually decided that building a pavilion would provide much needed seating for future events. In the spirit of Yankee ingenuity, the Legion gathered materials for the pavilion from organizations that were renovating their buildings. These organizations happily donated usable materials, including an entire building.

When the grass needed to be mowed, volunteers brought their lawn mowers and got the job done. Ben Rose would bring his family's farm tractor, with rotary mower on the back, to get the foot-tall grass in the playing field cut. When Rance Wheply was Commander, he decided it was time that the Legion had their own mower. He went to Grossman's and talked them into selling the Legion two riding mowers for the total cost of \$1,300. He then got raffle tickets printed to sell with one of the riding mowers as the prize. Rance and his wife, Gerry, along with Johnny Rose, got permission to stand outside of the Berk's Dept Store in Raynham (at that time Berk's was the ONLY dept store in the area) and they sold the tickets. The winner got a riding mower and the Legion got theirs for FREE!

Sadly, in January of 1980 local boys broke into the Legion and set the building on fire. The whole interior of the building was burned, as well as the attic, resulting in a hole through the roof. The members worked hard to repair the building so it could continue to benefit the community.

The American Legion is a non-profit organization. All monies earned are used to maintain the building and benefit programs like scholarships, disaster relief, and support of wounded service members.
